# FOOD & WINE THE PERFECT PAIRING



The Golden State stretches nearly 800 miles tall. Each region within its bounds has different terrain, climates, landmarks, and things to offer. We are proud to have an office on the West Coast nearly equidistant between San Francisco and Los Angeles, away from the fast-paced nature of the state's urban cities where sleepy beach towns are joined by tight-knit communities. There is one more part that makes this area shine – our vineyards and wineries. Our Central Coast California office is located between the Paso Robles and San Luis Obispo wine regions. Here the vintners have long been dedicated to crafting award-winning wines with hospitality that is second to none.

These different wines are just as unique as California itself. The characteristics are created in three main ways. First, the variety. The type of grape used to make the wine will bring some of its own personality to the table. A Pinot Noir will be a lot lighter than a bold Cabernet Sauvignon. The growing environment also plays a large role – from climate to soil. Vines planted in cooler temperatures may produce earthy wines, while warmer temperature wines will be fruit-forward. The last factor may be the biggest – the winemaker. Countless decisions are made for each wine, and the winemaker's personal touch makes each release unique.

Now, there's one final way to play with the taste of your wine, and it's your job! Pairing wines with food is a fun way to bring out hidden flavors you couldn't taste before. Keep in mind that white wines pair best with light meats like chicken and fish, while red wines pair best with red meat. You want to have the wine taste more acidic than the dish, and the wine should taste sweeter than the food. There are countless other rules for wine pairings, but get creative and see what speaks to you. You'll find we curated two of our favorite recipes with their perfect pairings for you to enjoy on the next page.



# BUTTERNUT RISOTTO SQUASH RISOTTO

- 7C Low-Sodium Chicken Broth
- 1T Extra-Virgin Olive Oil
- 1 Small Chopped Onion
- 2T Butter, Divided
- 4C Cubed Butternut Squash
- 8 Minced Garlic Cloves
- 2C Arborio Rice
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>o</sub>C White Wine
- 1C Grated Parmesan
- 2T Freshly Chopped Sage
- 01. In a medium saucepan over medium heat, bring chicken broth to a simmer. Reduce heat to low.
- 02. In a large pot or Dutch oven, heat oil. Add onion and cook, stirring often, until beginning to soften, about 5 minutes. Stir in squash, 1 tablespoon butter and garlic. Cook until the squash is beginning to color around edges and then soft, about 6 minutes. Season with salt and pepper.
- 03. Stir in remaining tablespoon butter arborio rice, stirring quickly. Cook until the grains are well-coated and smell slightly toasty, about 2 minutes. Add the wine and cook until the wine has mostly absorbed.
- 04. Add about 1 cup hot broth. Stirring often, cook until the rice has mostly absorbed liquid. Add remaining broth about 1 cup at a time, continuing to allow the rice to absorb each addition before adding more.
- 05. Stir often and cook until squash is tender and risotto is all dente and creamy, not mushy, about 25 minutes. Stir in Parmesan and sage, then season with salt and pepper before serving.

# HOLIDAY RIBEYE

- 1 2" Thick Bone-In Ribeye Steak
- Kosher Salt
- Ground Black Pepper
- 1T Extra-Virgin Olive Oil
- 2T Unsalted Butter

- Smashed Garlic Cloves
- 2-3 Sprigs Fresh Thyme
- 2-3 Sprigs Fresh Rosemary
- Flaky Sea Salt
- 01. On a plate, season steak generously with salt and pepper. Let sit up to 30 minutes to let steak come to room temperature.
- 02. In a large cast-iron skillet over medium high, heat oil until very hot. Add steak and cook until a dark crust forms on the bottom side, about 6 to 7 minutes.
- 03. Flip the steak and cook, undisturbed, 6 minutes more.
- 04. Reduce heat to medium low and add butter, garlic, thyme, and rosemary. Continue cooking, using a spoon to baste the steak with the butter in the bottom of the pan and flipping the steak halfway through, until steak is medium-rare (about 120°), about 5 minutes more.
- 05. Remove steak to a cutting board and let rest 10 minutes before slicing. Sprinkle with flaky sea salt before serving.

Do you add festive cheer to your cards and letters with seasonal postage? The United States Postal Service® works to cheer up mail with Forever Stamps made for festive holidays such as Valentine's Day and Halloween. They sure don't stop there, though. The U.S. Postal Service brings the magic of the holidays to children everywhere by lending a helping hand to the hard workers of the North Pole! Grab a cup of cocoa to get in the holiday mindset and learn more about these heart-warming programs.

## USPS Operation Santa® Legacy Program

This year marks the 108th year of the USPS Operation Santa® program. Since 1912, postal employees and customers have helped children experience the magic of the holidays by adopting their letters to Santa. In early December, customers wanting to browse through and adopt letters in person can do so in New York City and Chicago. Please go to usps.com/holidaynews for additional information.

### USPS Operation Santa® Digital Program

In 2017, USPS Operation Santa went digital in a pilot program in New York City. Only customers in NYC could adopt letters. In 2018, the program expanded to seven cities in a volume test. The Digital program enables customers to go online at USPSOperationSanta.com beginning mid-November; go through a short registration and ID verification process; then, browse and adopt letters written to Santa from their computers.

This year, the program is expanding to 17 cities around the country in a larger volume test. Letters written to Santa from the following cities will populate the USPSOperationSanta.com website: Austin, TX, Baltimore, MD, Boston, MA, Chicago, IL, Cleveland OH, Denver CO, Grand Rapids MI, Hatteras Island, NC, Los Angeles CA, New York NY, Ocracoke Island, NC, Orlando FL, Philadelphia PA, Phoenix AZ, Sacramento CA, San Juan PR, and Washington DC.

Once the letter is adopted, it is sent via email to the customer with a QR code. Once the customer selects a gift, he or she returns to the Post Office. The QR code is then attached to the gift package and is presented to a clerk at any of the 19,000+ RSS-capable retail offices. These offices are identified on usps.com/locator as "Label Broker" locations. The clerk scans the QR code, the customer pays postage, and then the clerk prints the shipping label and affixes it to the box without the customer seeing the destination.

### Send a Letter to Santa

In addition to allowing letters to Santa to flow seamlessly for redaction, giving Santa an official postal address allows for a more efficient mail processing operation. Use Santa Claus, 123 Elf Road, North Pole, 88888.


The Holiday Delights stamps use a palette of red, green and white to depict images inspired by vintage ornaments and Scandinavian folk art.

The Postal Service released the Holiday Delights, stamps that are inspired by folk art but with a modern graphic vibe, on Thursday, Sept. 24.

Illustrator Kirsten Ulve used a traditional palette of red, green and white, and channeled her love of Christmas, vintage ornaments and Scandinavian folk art to create unique digital illustrations of four holiday icons: a prancing reindeer with antlers; an ornament tied with a bow and ready to hang; a tree topped with a star; and a stocking holding a teddy bear and a sprig of holly.

Antonio Alcalá, a USPS art director, designed the Forever stamps, which are available in panes of 20 at Post Offices and at usps.com. Holiday Delights is one of several holiday stamp releases this year, along with Winter Scenes, Our Lady of Guápulo, Kwanzaa and Hanukkah.


